

the reasonableness and good faith of the positions advanced by the parties both during and prior to trial; (4) the extent of the fees incurred by both parties; (5) any fees previously awarded; (6) the amount of fees previously paid to counsel by each party; (7) the results obtained; (8) the degree to which fees were incurred to enforce existing orders or to compel discovery; and (9) any other factor bearing on the fairness of the award. R. 5:3-5. Additionally, the court must consider: (1) the applicant's need; (2) the other party's ability to pay; and (3) the good or bad faith of both parties. Williams v. Williams, 59 N.J. 229, 233 (1971). After a review of these factors, the Court will not award any counsel fees at this time.

8. **Other Relief.** Mother's request for such other relief as the Court deems just is **DENIED without prejudice**. Mother fails to set forth sufficient factual or legal basis for the relief requested at this time.

**Regarding Father's Requests for Relief:**

1. **Documentation of Money Received from Social Security.** Father's request that Mother provide a complete set of documentation of all the monies that she has received from Social Security disability, outlining the initial lump sum deposits and on-going monthly deposits is **DENIED without prejudice**. Father fails to set forth sufficient factual or legal basis for the relief requested at this time

2. **Disbursement of Social Security Funds.** Father's request that Plaintiff provide a complete accounting record of how she is disbursing the monies received from Social Security disability that the children have been receiving is **DENIED without prejudice**. Father fails to set forth sufficient factual or legal basis for the relief requested at this time.

3. **Return of Payments.** Father's request that Mother return to Father "all monies received from child protective services" is **DENIED without prejudice**. Father fails to set forth sufficient factual or legal basis for the relief requested at this time.
